Learning outcomes and competences

At the end of the course unit the learner is expected to be able to:

1. Translate different types of material on and for different kinds of media and target audiences, using appropriate tools and techniques.
2. Identify specific problems of different text types, genres and materials and solve them on a pre-professional level.
3. Recognize and practise the several work stages involved in translation from pre-translation tasks to post-translation tasks, including time management.
4. Analyse and justify translation choices, using the appropriate metalanguage.
5. Identify and assess strategies and resources necessary to complete the proposed tasks.
6. Complete the proposed tasks autonomously.

Course contents

The process of translation, its implications and tasks throughout its several stages in both foreign languages. Topics to be translated are from the field of tourism and gastronomy, journalism, corporate and management discourse.

Course contents (extended version)

1. Translation tasks
 - Analysis of the source text, its main translational issues and solutions to overcome them.
 - Summarising tasks, identifying keywords, working with dictionaries and grammars.
 - Make effective use of search engines, terminological databases, among others.
 - Implementation of style guides and linguistic conventions to create cohesion in the target text.
 - Assessment of the target text.
 - Use of different online tools to convert different files.
 - Literacy in machine translation: output analysis and identification of the main issues.
2. Effective use of the CAT tool memoQ.
 - Creating projects, preparing the file for translation, translation of the segments and exporting.
 - Creating translation memories and termbases. Quality assurance tool.
