Course contents

The literary text and the film text. Literary genres and cinema. Cinematographic rewriting of literature. Comparative critical analysis; adaptation processes. Introduction to successful genres in mass culture.

Course contents (extended version)

1. The literary text and the filmic text: comparative methodologies-
2. Literary genres and cinema: preeminence of the narrative genre.
3. Cinematographic rewriting of literature:
 - some examples from the Spanish and English speaking contexts;
 - comparative critical analysis;
 - adaptation processes: examples of extension of reduction of literary narrative material.
4. Introduction to successful genres in mass culture:
 - fantastic literature/cinema;
 - science-fiction literature/cinema;
 - historical literature/cinema.
